- Vaccine Hunters, which helped an estimated 1.2 million Canadians get vaccinated against COVID-19.
- <u>Scarborough Health Network staff</u>, who have gone above and beyond to provide compassionate care for patients and roll out vaccines during the pandemic.
- <u>Edsel Mutia</u>, a charge nurse in North York General's intensive care unit, who keeps finding ways to lift people's spirits even amid the pandemic.
- <u>Leandra Briones</u>, a compassionate personal care worker caring for long-term-care residents with dementia and Alzheimer's disease.
- ICU staff at Scarborough General Hospital, who have pulled together to provide exceptional care to patients and their families during the pandemic.
- \bullet Joy Xu, who has founded several initiatives to increase academic accessibility and development opportunities for students.
- <u>Debbie Lee</u>, who pivoted during the pandemic to keep organizing health and wellness programs for seniors.
- <u>Honey Novick</u>, a singer and poet helping to make theatre and creative expression accessible for marginalized community members.
- Paul Nguyen, who launched a website promoting positive news and showcasing local talent in the Jane and Finch area.
- <u>Andrew Young</u>, a web developer who founded Vaccine Hunters Canada to help connect Canadians with COVID-19 vaccines
- James Ince, who mows a neighbourhood field to give kids a safe outdoor space to play.
- <u>Tina-Nadia Gopal-Chambers</u>, who founded a charitable organization helping youth in custody awaiting trial access education.
- Jovan Biggart, who empowers and mentors youth through basketball.
- <u>Cathy Tsong Deh Kwe</u>, an advocate and activist who helps vulnerable people and empowers others while speaking out about Indigenous issues and other causes.
- <u>Mary Hawk</u>, who co-founded a charity providing free self-care services for underprivileged women and raising awareness about women's issues.
- Nelson Camara, a pastor running an outreach program helping persons experiencing homelessness.

Star Metroland Toronto first introduced the Urban Hero Awards in Etobicoke in 2009. From there, it grew to honour people in Scarborough and North York and then residents across Toronto.
